Specific Focus on Diversity & Inclusion - 'MASI'

According to OECD low-educated immigrants often have relatively high employment rates compared with their native-born peers but are stuck in low-quality jobs. In contrast, tertiary-educated immigrants, particular those who have foreign qualifications, have lower employment rates than their native-born peers.

Much remains to be done, especially to give immigrants and their children the opportunities to succeed in life. Improving their integration is vital to delivering a more prosperous, inclusive future for all. Hence we launch our mentoring programme 'MASI'.

'MASI' in Greek means 'together'. Our 'MASI' programme 'pairs' young migrants with accomplished thought leaders and successful professionals for 8-month cycles. The overall goal of the programme is to guide and mentor young immigrants on skills building, integration and personal and professional development.
